Charitable Giving

We all have personal reasons when gifting to the charities we love. While your generosity certainly helps the organization to which you are gifting it can also help you financially. The most common and straightforward gift made is the donation of cash/check. Donations to 501(c)3 organizations are tax deductible and noted on your itemized tax return. As a reminder, starting in 2007, you must have a cancelled check, credit card statement or a written receipt from the charity in order to deduct any donation no matter the dollar amount.

All bunnies that come into Safe Haven Rabbit Rescue receive medical exams, they are spayed/neutered, some require medication or surgery, they are given fresh green foods to eat daily, quality hay and pellets, toys to play with and are kept in spacious pens with toys, tunnels, boxes and clean litter boxes. Adoption fees are kept minimal to encourage adoption, so they do not even cover the cost of the spay or neuter which is why receiving donations are important and vital to Safe Haven's existence.

Some ideas of how you can help

- * Be generous and donate.
- * Pass this information along to someone who too has a generous heart.
- * Some companies offer their employees matching gift programs and volunteer grant programs ... does yours?
- * Sponsor a fund raiser (garage sale or candy/snack box at work) and donate the proceeds.

Millie

*Adopted April 1, 2007

Looking on the internet, we saw a docile, beautifully colored bunny who seemed to have a letter "M" engraved in her fur on her nose. Her name was Millie -"M" for Millie, just like Russ, my husband's grandmother's name. We made arrangements to meet Millie at Karen's house. We talked a bit, and then were introduced to a rabbit who stole our hearts within thirty seconds.

Russ climbed into the pen and was down nose-to nose on his hands and knees with Millie, immediately; clearly, they were already friends. Karen, being quite perceptive, noticed I didn't interact much and had a bit of a problem standing. She offered me a chair which showed what a caring person she is. Having raised three bunnies, previously, while we raised our four now adult children, we pretty much knew the routines and challenges of bunny care. Like excited children ourselves, we worked hard to make a comfortable and safe area in our living room.

Within two months, Millie grew to love and respect us, especially Russ, who has a gentle way with all animals. Amazingly, Millie also seemed to perceive that I could not bend over to pet her or pick her up. She developed her own method of giving "me" attention by coming over to me and bumping my ankles with her nose and then sitting with me. Russ would put her on my lap and she'd snuggle against my arm and, she and I would "talk".

Two months later, I was in the hospital having my second back surgery. I spent a week in the hospital following an eight and one half hour replacement of nearly all my discs joined by two titanium rods. Then, it was three more weeks in rehabilitation. Russ took care of Millie mornings and in-between visiting me. We also had a friend and her mom come everyday for an hour or two twice a day to keep Millie safe and the air temperature right. I was sure that Millie would forget me since we only had her two months. Russ assured me that everyday she went to look for me in our room. Then, finally, after a month away, my daughter brought me home and up the six stairs.



Millie came into the room, took one look at me and one listen to my voice, and she did the biggest, wildest, happiest bunny dance that you have ever seen, always stopping to see if I was watching! Then, Russ picked her up and put her on my bed and I think we both cried tears of joy.

Even as important as remembering me, Millie, instinctively knew that I was very ill. As a mother would do for her child, Millie became very protective of me and never left my side. Soon, a physical therapist would come up to my room several days a week to help with my recovery. Millie would poke her with her nose to let the therapist know that Millie was there "guarding" me. After each therapy session, Millie would come out rubbing my legs with her nose, almost as if she was telling me that I did well.

Then one day came the big step. Going down the six stairs to the living room was slow and difficult, but there was always the encouragement of Millie, exactly two steps behind me. She walked when I walked and she stepped when I stepped. Escorting me right to my sitting place, she'd always sit right next to me. Finally, Russ started putting her on my lap again where she'd stare into my eyes and though I can't explain it, she helped me feel well.

Finally, after nearly three months most all of my home helpers were gone, back to work and school, Millie and I developed our own routine with her patience and my striving for limited independence. We developed our own slow-paced routine with Millie always at my side. She never got in my way; just waited patiently. Sometimes she'd sense I was in tremendous pain, and she'd come and sit on my feet, or stand up with her two front paws on the edge of my chair, so that I could pet her, and we'd both feel better.

It's been five months, and I have a very long way to go. I will walk normally without pain again with the help of medicine, a wonderful helpful family, lots of physical therapy, but most of all the love and instincts of the most wonderful "Rehabilitation Rabbit".

Do consider adopting a bunny! They don't bark, are easily litter trained and offer unconditional love to the healthy and to the sick.

A week later, they were taken out a couple times a day to go on dates, getting to know each other. At first Yoshi lunged and grunted at Harley every time he tried to come sniff her. This being our first experience bonding, we were rather at a loss for what to expect and do. Many emails went back and forth to and from Karen. She returned again to help out, check on the couple and lend some advice. Karen told us Harley needed to stand his ground and show Yoshi he wouldn't back down in order for them to move on in their relationship. In answer to Karen's assessment, Harley did a double pawed bongo drum style repartee on Yoshi's head. She got the message.

So, when Harley began to show his valor, Yoshi turned tail and ran away squealing! It was as if the warrior princess needed him to prove his strength. Now they began to treat each other with respect and mutual interest. The whole process took about three weeks. It seemed like a lot of work at the time, but the payoff has been more than worth it.

They are both so happy and good for each other. Harley thinks he's all that with an older woman at his side; he's becoming more confident daily. Yoshi couldn't be happier now that she has a younger male following her around, and grooming her. She actually became really friendly, running up to greet people more than ever.



The happy couple lives in Yoshi's old territory now; she welcomed Harley right in. They go on team forays into the hardwood territory of the kitchen, living and dining room, but return to home base in the preferred carpeted family room. They are chewing their way through cardboard

labyrinths designed by our two boys and learning tricks using "clicker training" now (stand-up, gimme ten, circles and come).
